Eligibility: The contest is open to United States high school students in grades nine through twelve attending public, private, parochial, or home schools; U.S. students under the age of twenty enrolled in a high school correspondence/GED program in any of the fifty states, the District of Columbia, or the U.S. territories; and U.S. citizens attending schools overseas. Past winners and finalists are not eligible to participate. Employees of John Hancock Financial Services and members of their families are not eligible to participate. Essays can be no more than 1,000 words but must be a minimum of 700 words.

Award: The winner receives **\$10,000** comprised of a **\$5,000** cash award and **\$5,000** from John Hancock. The winner and his or her family are invited to the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library in Boston in May to accept his/her award. Travel and lodging expenses will be paid for the trip to Boston for the winning student and his or her parents. A second place winner receives a **\$1,000** cash award. Up to five finalists each receive a **\$500** cash award.

Deadline: *The 2018 contest will open for submissions on September 1, 2017. And close on January 4, 2018*

Eligibility:

- Filene Music Scholarships are awarded each year through a performance competition coordinated by Skidmore's Department of Music.
- Filene Scholars are not required to major in music; they are expected, however, to continue to develop their skills through private instruction in the Music Department each semester and to participate in department ensembles each semester as determined by the department chair.
- The competition is open to high school seniors who meet the criteria for admission to Skidmore College and who apply for admission by January 15, 2018. Students are allowed to compete only once. Children and dependents of Skidmore College faculty and staff are not eligible for the competition.

Award: 4 year grant totaling \$48,000 (12,000 per year) is awarded to competition winners without consideration of financial need, and it is credited in \$6,000 installments to the recipient's account in the fall and spring semesters.

Matthews & Swift Educational Trust Scholarships

This scholarship is intended for the children of military service members or law enforcement officers who have been injured or killed, and plan to attend or are attending a Catholic College or University.

- Scholarships are available to children of members in good standing who, while serving in the military forces of their country in a combat zone, have been killed or wounded
 - *Applications must be filed within two years of the death or determination of total and permanent disability of the member.*
- Scholarships may also be awarded to children of members in good standing who are full-time law enforcement officers or full-time firefighters who have died as a result of criminal violence directed at them.
 - *Applications must be filed within two years of the date of death of the member.*

Award: Up to \$25,000 per year for tuition only

Benjamin A. Gilman International Scholarship Program

Eligibility:

- The applicant must be receiving a Federal Pell Grant or provide proof that he/she will be receiving a Pell Grant at the time of application or during the term of his/her study abroad program or internship.
- The applicant is applying to or has been accepted into a study abroad program or internship eligible for credit by the student's accredited institution of higher education in the U.S.
- The applicant is studying or interning abroad for at least four weeks (28 days) in one country - or two weeks (14 days) for current community college students - and no more than one academic year. Programs going to more than one country are eligible if the student will be in one country for at least four consecutive weeks.
- The applicant is studying or interning abroad in any country except those on the U.S. Department of State's current Travel Warning list. Students applying to programs in Mexico may only apply for scholarships to support study in Mexican states where no advisory is in effect according to the U.S. Department of State Travel Warning list.

Award: Awards of up to \$5,000 are made for up to one academic year of undergraduate study abroad. Award amounts will vary based on student's rank in the selection process, their financial need and length of program with the average award being \$4,000. Gilman Scholarship funds may only be used to cover eligible study abroad program costs and related expenses. These include: program tuition and fees, room and board, books, local transportation, health insurance and international airfare. Personal expenses such as clothing, entertainment, electronics and excursions outside of the program are not eligible for use of Gilman Scholarship funds. Students who apply for and receive the Gilman Scholarship to study abroad are then eligible to receive an additional \$3,000 Critical Need Language Supplement from the Gilman Scholarship Program for a total possible award of up to \$8,000 if they are studying a critical need language while abroad.

Deadline: The application period for the Spring 2018 and Summer 2018 program will open in Mid-August 2017, Deadline for Summer 2018 will be in March 2018

Eligibility:

To be eligible for scholarship consideration, you must:

- Achieve an SAT composite of 1180 on tests taken prior to March 2016 (math and critical reading portions only) or ACT composite of 26.
 - SAT composite of 930 on tests taken after March 2016 with new SAT format (math and critical reading portions only) will be determined on a case-by-case basis to see if they meet eligibility requirements once an applicant uploads their scores.
- Applicant must attain a cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher. There are no waivers or exceptions.
- Before you are eligible for the scholarship interview, you must complete the Physical Fitness Assessment (which consists of three events: crunches, push-ups, pull-ups and a 1.5-mile run) and submit the Letter of Certification.

 - Graduate from a high school or have an equivalent certificate.
 - Be 17 years old prior to scholarship activation.
 - Be under 31 years old as of December 31 of the year you will be commissioned.
 - You cannot be enrolled full time at a college or university (except for joint high school/college programs).
 - If you are the sole provider for another person (e.g., single parent, guardian for younger sibling, etc.), please contact the nearest Air Force ROTC detachment admissions representative for dependent care plan information.
